FROM THE LIFESPAN EDUCATION DIRECTOR

WHAT'S NEW FOR THE FALL IN LIFESPAN RE

In addition to our regular RE classes that are starting on September 18th, which you can find out about by visiting the RE Welcome table in the community room after services or by visiting the church web site, I want to let you know about a few exciting initiatives starting planned for this fall.

Family Choir for children, youth and adults

The purpose of the choir is to get people of all ages and abilities to sing and learn UU hymns and have fun doing it. For our initial performance, we will sing Wade in the Water for the Sunday service on October 30. Sometime in the spring we'll sing for another Sunday service and if there is interest, we may add more dates. Rehearsals for the Oct 30 performance will be on Sunday mornings, Oct 16 and 23 at 9:30am. Participants must come to at least one rehearsal and a parent should accompany their younger children. There is no age limit and you do not have to commit to the entire year. Choral experience or ability to read music are not required. We'll also sing a few other songs during rehearsals just to become familiar with the hymns. My primary resource book will be *Come Sing a Song with Me*, produced by the UU Musicians Network and available on the UUA bookstore (product code 1266). It has 25 of the most popular and accessible hymns from the *Singing the Living Tradition* and *Singing the Journey* hymnals, with simple arrangements. Music can convey our UU values in a distilled yet compelling way. I look forward to making our hymns more accessible and fun for you and your children.

Being a Unitarian Universalist Parent adult RE class

With only about 30 hours per year of UU classroom religious education for our children, the majority of their religious education occurs in the home, either explicitly or implicitly. For most children, parents are the primary source of spiritual and religious development. Parents are continually asking how they can better understand and interpret UU values during the week. They feel under pressure to help their children respond to such questions as: What is the Bible? What do UU's believe about God, or what about heaven and hell? Parents want to know how they can make their homes stronger centers for UU values. In five sessions, this course will

- Do an initial theological exploration with discussion by participants
- Examine ways we can encourage a greater sense of our religion in our family lives

- Provide an opportunity for parents to raise and discuss real-life childrearing questions and challenges and how these might be answered from a UU perspective.

Sessions will be on Sundays from noon to 1:30, October 16, 23 and 30 and November 13 and 20. Childcare will be available and lunch will be provided for the first session, with a \$5.00 fee to cover the food. 


