Our Theme for April: What Does It Mean to be a Community of Transformation?

This month's theme is perfectly suited to our current ongoing Transformational Planning efforts to help our Beloved Community become all that it can be.

True transformation always entails an element of mystery because we can't necessarily be sure of where we're going and what we're going to become. Think about the conversation you might have with a kernel of corn about the green growing plant that is its destiny. It might tell you that it doesn't make sense, that it knows what it is, and cracking open to become a plant isn't on the agenda.

The truth is, we can't fully know what it's going to be like until we get there. But we can begin to imagine what transformation might mean, and that imagination might fuel our commitment to the process. Sometimes we need faith to have hope, but doesn't that sound like what a church should be doing? You know: faith, hope, and charity and all?

After all, being a church means engaging the holy conversation about how love shapes the world, and calling its members to do the most important work there is: transforming the world, being a place where people are committed to loving one another in thought, word, and deed; a community committed to completing the evolutionary journey from fear to love, and shining its light so that our society and the world will be called to do the same.

This is a vision that gives me hope for a congregation transformed into its highest potential. How about you?

Meeting With Me

I've heard that there is some confusion about how to meet with me. Some have even suggested that my lack of posted office hours makes me hard to find – but nothing could be further from the truth!

My experience, and that of many of my colleagues, has shown that the practice of regular office hours is not a very useful way for a minister to spend time. Open office hours are an outdated artefact of the neighborhood church, where everyone lives within easy access of the church and people just "drop by." But since most of our congregations are quite spread out geographically – as ours most certainly is – people don't just walk in.

We've found that it works much better to make ourselves more accessible through appointments. It's easy to do. Just send me an email or call and leave a message. My goal is to be completely accessible to everyone in our community for questions, conversation, and support.

Is Your Glass Half Empty or Half Full?

By now, most of you know about the Transformational Planning effort we are undertaking. The planning is still in the early stages. We have a focused Transformational Planning Team (TPT)

that is providing early guidance and leadership. We are using the work of a national leadership consultant as a guide. We have discussed the process with the Board of Trustees over many months. The Board is preparing to take on a leadership role when we enter future stages of planning. We have mentioned the work in Sunday announcements. I have discussed the process in my Link column. We explained the idea more fully at a recent Breakfast Forum.

To be honest, the more work we do to introduce and discuss the concept, the more work I (and, I suspect, others) find needs to be done in the early stages...even before we move on to "Phase 2". In fact, we're considering taking more time than originally envisioned for Phase 1, to provide a more solid foundation upon which to build the plan.

I'm a city planning consultant by profession, which I only mention because, no matter where we consulted, we had to work with the circumstances and assets already in place. I could view each situation as a glass half full (great people and things to work with) or half empty (so little to work with, so much to do).

So it is with our Transformational Planning work. We, the UUCLV congregation, are who we are. We have evolved into today's congregation. We start from here. True, we have problems. Doesn't every church? We also have wonderful resources, including people with many talents as well as the collective heart of our congregation, and we will put our resources to use solving our problems as we move forward.

Our Transformational Plan will serve as our guide, just as similar planning has worked for other thriving congregations, such as the University Unitarian Church in Seattle, WA. Your leadership team will guide the UUCLV plan with the help of a knowledgeable and experienced consultant.

So, the choice is yours. As your leadership moves to strengthen and grow the spirit of the UUCLV and plan

for our future, how do you feel about the church? Is the glass half empty or half full?

I choose to see the glass as half full. If you feel the glass is half empty. I encourage you to seek out one (or more) members of the TPT to discuss your feelings.

UUCLV SAYS GOODBYE TO A SUCCESSFUL SHELTER SEASON

As of March 31, 2017, another season successfully came to a close for the UUCLV emergency shelter for homeless men. With winter weather battering the Lehigh Valley with snow and cold temperatures late into March, the shelter was busy serving its guests to the very end of the season.

From December 1, 2016 – March 31, 2017, the emergency shelter was honored to provide its guests with a warm, safe place to sleep, hot meals (dinner and breakfast), showers and clothes every Wednesday night/Thursday morning. Over the course of the season, a total of 107 men found shelter in our church, and were able to enjoy entertainment like bingo, movies and music (and there even may have been some dancing!), as well as the camaraderie of our volunteers. With the help of Bob Rapp from Bethlehem Emergency Sheltering, several guests were also able to find permanent, affordable housing.

This year, the hard work and dedication of 67 volunteers, spearheaded by Ann Gastinger, made the UUCLV emergency shelter possible. CREATING A SAFE HAVEN: UUCLV'S HAVEN

Picture, if you will, the classic Milton Bradley game of Perfection: that recessed yellow plastic square studded with strangely shaped holes into which you need to place small oddly shaped pieces before the clock runs out or, BAM! all the pieces fly up into the air. Each piece has it's own niche and sooner or later, you'll find it.

Let's imagine a piece that doesn't fit, unlike the ones provided by the game's designers, a piece that's waiting to be placed but becomes a frustration as the timer ticks off the seconds. This, according to one of the members of HAVEN, a youth group at the Unitarian Universalist Church of the Lehigh Valley in Bethlehem, is what it feels like to be a young LGBTQIA (lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, questioning, intersex, allies) person looking for acceptance.

Youths who identify as LGBTQIA need, like everybody else, to develop an understanding of who they are and a sense of their gender identity. If you're that young person and you feel like you don't fit, you might wonder how and where to go about it and how to find trustworthy help and support.

Conceived in 2000 and opened in 2001, HAVEN was founded by Ilse Stoll, George Van Doren and Pete Pellegrino. Bethlehem area youth from 14 to 20 can attend meetings and expect a safe supportive environment with positive role models and peer support. Group members, facilitators and allies sponsor social and recreational activities as well as the weekly discussions. There's even an annual HAVEN Prom!

HAVEN stands for the basics, what every young person needs: Hope, Acceptance, Validation, Equality and Nurturing. Since 2001, about 1500 young people have benefitted from it's warm and encouraging presence, helping each other to navigate important issues like coming out, handling anxiety, depression, discrimination and negative peer pressure and understanding themselves better. About two new persons come each week to their meetings.

Youth at a HAVEN meeting say things like, "HAVEN helps us to know that we're not alone," and "We have instant friends in the room, even the first time we come." "HAVEN's the best thing I've ever done; it's the high point of my week," said one. Research shows that LGBTQI youth are at risk of higher rates of anxiety and depression from experiencing the discrimination, violence and hate that are directed against them. Negative social attitudes take a terrible toll on one's sense of self-worth and LGBTQI teens often have higher rates of anxiety, depression and suicidal thoughts, suicidal plans and attempts.

"This group, HAVEN, deters suicide," announced one of its members proudly. "If kids come here, they can live with themselves," she said. Others added that hanging out with this supportive group of friends grows self-confidence and encourages embracing who you are, creating motivation to make it through another week.

A haven is a place of safety and refuge, a place to shelter in a storm of some kind. The designated room for the program has high windows and a single door and it's filled with comfortable furniture. Overheated by the building's antiquated radiators, it's pretty warm in there on a winter's evening. It's a true haven in a physical and an emotional sense.

"I love HAVEN and all it represents," one teen said. "It helped me learn how to be empathic and tolerant."

And wouldn't we want that for all our children?


Adults from the community and from Pride, along with HAVEN Facilitators, will chaperone the festivities.
