# SHARED PLATE FOR JULY: THE COMMUNITY BIKE WORKS

Community Bike Works provides inner-city children living in at-risk situations with meaningful work-ethic alternatives to gangs, drugs and the streets. We use bicycles, peer role models and adult mentors to develop and nurture relationships and to engage youth; and once engaged, influence their behavior and their outlook about school and life.

In the Earn a Bike program students work from a manual, and each student keeps a journal of his or her progress. Students arrive for class on time and ready to work, work at a task until completed, see the satisfaction of turning a broken bike into a functional one. Once students complete their classes, they earn their refurbished bike and new helmet.

# FROM THE LIFESPAN EDUCATION COORDINATOR

### RELIGIOUS EDUCATION (RE) FOR CHILDREN AND YOUTH

This summer I will be taking an on-line course on UU history on Thursday evenings, sponsored by the UUA. Some of the names and dates are familiar to me from viewing the film series *Long Strange Trip* (see below if you are interested in borrowing the DVDs). This class will go more deeply in the subject and we'll cover areas not touched by the film series, such as the contributions and tribulations of African American Unitarian Universalists. With respect to race, the history of our denomination is a contradictory mix of positives and negatives. We were in the forefront of the Abolitionist movement, yet in the 20th century, African Americans UUs faced marginalization, indifference and hostility. Our denomination almost split apart in the 1960s when the Black Empowerment movement insisted on a greater voice in funding priorities and policy making. Promises of financial support were made that couldn't be kept, causing bitterness and hastening the departure of many African Americans from our denomination.

When our youth took the heritage trip to Boston last May, I tried to find some curricula for them so they would have a greater appreciation of the sites they were visiting. The only things available were one workshop in the Coming of Age curriculum and the third chapter in the Long Strange Trip DVD series about American Unitarianism. My UU History class requires that I complete a project, either by myself or in partnership. I hope to in some small part correct that oversight by creating a short series of UU history classes for 5-6 graders that will provide an entrée into our interesting history. My hope is to field test it here next year.
