We completed our 2015-16 church fiscal year on June 30 and I'm happy to report that UUCLV finished the year just barely 'in the black', and we are in reasonable financial shape heading into 2016-17 A summary of our income and expenses through June 2016 is as follows:

Further details are available in the monthly financial reports posted on the UUCLV website.

Thanks to total pledge payments over budget, strong fundraising income, unanticipated non-pledge contributions, and most expenses at budgeted amounts, we were able to end up with a small surplus without the anticipated need to tap into our reserves. This was in spite of losing significant rental income and taking on some added employee expenses during the year. If you've not completed your pledge payments for last year please do so as soon as possible. If you have – thank you.

Looking ahead to the new church year remember that our expenses never stop – even during the summer. If you've prepaid some or all of your 2016-17 pledge – thank you for helping our cash flow. Pledge payments make up the lion's share of our income, so it is important that we all start paying and stay current with our new year pledge commitments.

The three year payment period for our Capital Campaign ended on April 30. While we've formally ended the program we are still accepting payments from those who have not completed their capital pledge commitments. As of June 30 over \$473K in Capital pledge payments have been received, 95% out of a total of \$500K pledged. Final planning continues for the most extensive and expensive capital improvement task in our long range plan - improving church access.

FROM THE LIFESPAN EDUCATION COORDINATOR

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION (RE) FOR CHILDREN AND YOUTH

Spirit of Life

As Director of Lifespan Religious Education, August tells me it is time to turn my attention to classes for adults as well as children. Although my job title contains the phrase education, I prefer the phrase faith development. The word education implies that the class leader will be teaching other people's knowledge to the participants. Most of the programs in the UUA's Tapestry of Faith curricula are more about helping each participant to be able to identify and articulate and deepen their own beliefs. As I looked at the menu of program offerings, one caught my eye in particular because of its relevance to a ritual we all share every Sunday – the singing of the hymn Spirit of Life after we share our joys and concerns. The program Spirit of Life is a 9-session workshop based on the song we sing every Sunday. To quote the description from the introduction:

Many Unitarian Universalists find the song deeply meaningful. Its imagery is beautiful. Its words are inclusive of Unitarian Universalists all along our theological spectrum. Its tune grows on its singers and listeners, and many use the song to help themselves grow...

Barbara Hamilton-Holway's Spirit of Life program seeks to be like the song from which it derives its name and bring meaning, beauty, inclusivity, and growth to Unitarian Universalist adults as they

deepen their spiritual awareness and connections. During each session, participants examine a phrase of the song. Session 1, Spirit of Life, introduces the group to each other and explores what our spiritual practices are. Workshop 2, Sing in My heart, is about celebrations and rituals. Workshop 3, The Stirrings of Compassion, is about Caring for One Another, and so on as we work our way through the phrases of the song. I am pleased to say that Rev. Robin Capoor will co-lead the program with me. Details, such as dates and times, will be worked out in August.

It's kind of odd how little time we spend as UU's thinking about what we believe. We tend to skip the theology part and go straight to the doing part – getting involved in social justice issues or in assisting the needy, or doing important committee work. There is nothing wrong with that. Making the world a better place is a core value of Unitarianism and Universalism. It's something of which we can be very proud. Nevertheless, we miss something when we skip the *being* part before we go to the *doing*. When we are connected with our religious or spiritual selves, we access a deeper motivation for doing our work: we are more patient with others; we tend to have a wider perspective; when we accomplish a task, there is a deeper satisfaction to it.

UUCLV ERS STAND UP FOR UNIVERSAL BACKGROUND CHECKS

On Thursday, July 9th, members of UUCLV were present at the Cease Fire PA rally in Allentown demanding universal background checks for any gun purchases. Phil Reiss, Tom Ulrich, Nancy Weston, Tara Stephenson, Sue Phillips, and Robin Capoor were on hand to make the case, one more time, for the need to register gun sales in order to save lives.

Organized by Cease Fire Pa and the Bradbury-Sullivan LGBT Community Center, the rally brought together approximately sixty people from around the Lehigh Valley who want to see the loss of life caused by firearms end. Speakers from the various organizations as well city and state government highlighted some of the very personal costs of not requiring background checks. ADOPT-A-WINDOW PROJECT

"When are you going to paint those outside window frames?" The question was asked at The UUCLV Annual Meeting in June and was heard loud and clear by Dora Davenport on the Property Committee and others including Margo Dixon and Karen West. This painting project is not in the 2016-17 budget because of the cost, but the job is sorely needed.

So an idea was born—ask members to "adopt a window" with a donation just for that cause. Call it Adopt-a Window! The Finance Committee heard this proposal in July and suggested a temporary loan so the work could be done this fall. Get the windows painted because they look bad and could further deteriorate the woodwork, the Finance Committee said. The next night, July 7th, the Board approved the idea unanimously.

Since this cost is outside of the yearly pledge that supports Church operations, we need to raise approximately \$22,000. With roughly 31 fixtures (windows, wooden louvers and other wood), this comes to \$700 per window.

Here is how it works. You can give the full sum of \$700 or partner with someone to adopt a window for painting. Church committees or others can band together to pay for a window. You will receive a letter explaining this project in August. If you can't give now, you can adopt a window and meet your commitment by June 1, 2017 so that the loan can be paid off. Checks will be administered by The UUCLV Treasurer, Jan Phillips, and can be mailed to The UUCLV—Adopt-a-Window Campaign, in an envelope provided in the August mailing or can be placed in the Sunday collection basket with "Adopt-a-Window Project" in the memo line.

When your "adoption" money is received, you will get a receipt for this tax deductible contribution to the Church. The Property Committee plans this work to begin this fall to avoid another winter with the potential for additional damage from snow, rain and cold temperatures. We will keep you updated, but you will know what's happening when you see scaffolding along beside the building.

THE LAY LISTENING COMMITTEE

The Lay Listening Committee would like to provide effective, outreach to as many of our church members as possible. To do that, we have redefined ourselves. We will now be known as the Community Listeners. We meet at 1:15 p.m. on the first Thursday of each month in the FM kitchen. Anyone concerned about making our congregation a true community is welcome to attend.

Be a Buddy. Could you be a "good buddy?" Sure you could. And if so, Community Listeners wants you.

We want all UUCLV members to know that they are important to our church, whether they can attend service or not. To reinforce this, we are calling for volunteers to serve as a "Church Buddy" to five other members of our congregation.

It's easy. All you have to do is contact your assigned "Buddies" once a month by e-mail, phone, personal visits, or just a wave at church to see how they are doing. If it seems that more than just listening is needed, contact Community Listeners or Church Family. We will try to assign Buddies based upon the Hospitality Neighborhood system for geographic convenience.
