October: What Does It Mean to Be a People of Courage?

Courageous people change the world. There are so many examples of that this month. October is LGBTQ history month and reminds us of the many who bravely moved (and continue to move) our world toward greater acceptance and affirmation. The revolutionary prophet of peace, Mohandas Gandhi, was born on October 2. Our Christian friends celebrate Reformation Day and Martin Luther's courage that changed how we all think about religious authority. We rightly honor such giants. The problem is most of us aren't that tall.

Or are we? Here's what we have to help each other remember: In addition to the heroic acts that alter history, there are also the daily choices that prevent history from altering us. Battling evil and bending the arc of the universe toward justice deserves praise, but there's also the ordinary work of integrity and not allowing yourself to be bent. This needs to be noticed as well. There's the bravery of embracing your beauty even when it doesn't fit the air-brushed images surrounding you. There's the courage of calling out the micro-aggressions that happen almost every day at work. And what about resisting the persistent seduction of status and stuff? The list is long: Turning down that drink one day at a time. Making yourself get out of bed when the depression tells you to stay there. Holding your partner's hand in public. Make no mistake, there are dozens of ordinary acts of bravery we rise up to everyday!

Or maybe we should say there are dozens of ordinary acts of bravery we help each other rise up to every day. Courage is not only noble; it's contagious. The bravery that makes it into the history books may save the world, but our ordinary courage keeps each other going. Watching someone else make it through another day helps us endure. Witnessing someone else confront bigotry allows us to bravely be more open about who we are. They say that courage is found by digging deep, but most often it is passed on.

So don't worry so much if you haven't changed the world yet. And certainly let's stop comparing ourselves with those giants. Our work rests less in looking up to them and more in looking over at and gaining strength from each other. And remembering that others are looking over at and needing strength from us.

FROM THE PRESIDENT

OUR CHALLENGE



I'm reading a UU book titled "The Growing Church". It emphasizes our challenge to grow our religious values and attract members who believe in those values.

Americans are far more lonely now than in the past. Data shows that more than half have no one to talk to. Data indicates that in a single generation the percentage of people with inadequate social support has gone from a quarter of the population to almost half and the biggest decline has been in the relationships that link us to our neighbors and our community. Loneliness is among us like an invisible epidemic.

We have unwittingly created a culture that has eliminated ties outside the household - television, internet, single parent families, and on and on. That makes for very lonely people.

These statistics represent spiritual and emotional longings that we can help provide. Many of these people seek relationships of depth, meaning and purpose. Our church can provide these relationships.

But can we provide them? Our history is that we have remained about the same size. That means that for every new member, we lose an old member. Someone leaves. Our data is variable but the main reason they leave is that we're not a very friendly church. We're not welcoming.

This is our challenge. How do we become more welcoming?

Our board, minister, Committee on Ministry and Church Planning will be addressing these issues. We will be determining what successful churches have done, what our weaknesses and strengths are and hopefully developing and implementing plans to lead us into the future, to make us a growing church, growing in spirituality, becoming a welcoming church and ultimately growing our membership. We have a lot to offer our community. We just have to figure out what needs to be done.

There's exciting times ahead. Join a committee and have some fun.

HANDICAPPED ACCESS ELEVATOR PROJECT TO BEGIN

The last major project on the UUCLV's capital improvement plan, the construction of a handicapped elevator, is scheduled to start the first week of October. The project involves constructing a concrete block shaft from the basement to the Sanctuary. Once the shaft is completed, the elevator will be installed in the shaft and will provide access to the Community Room, the RE/Administration floor, and the Sanctuary.

During periods of the project construction, there will be a lot of noise and dust generated. This is most likely to occur during construction of the elevator shaft. The Capital Projects Committee is working with our contractors and church staff to mitigate noise and dust conditions and to minimize disruptions to church operations, including rentals. Project activities will have minimal disruption on actual church services. The construction and installation of the elevator is expected to last at least four months.

THANKS TO UUCLV FOR THRIVE RETREAT EXPERIENCE

My name is Taneisha Lormand, and I am writing to thank you for sponsoring me in matching a UUA youth grant that enabled me to attend THRIVE. It is my understanding that when my family's request for sponsorship came to the Program Council in early 2017, individuals opened their wallets on the spot to sponsor me. Thank you!

THRIVE is a leadership retreat for UU youth of color that takes place over five days. The East Coast gathering was in Annapolis, MD at the end of July. I had an amazing time in fellowship with other UU youth of color, which included ten youth and three advisors. Each day was a new theme and there were thoughtful discussions around race, racism, gender identity, sexual orientation, classism, wealth, and privilege.

During the course of the retreat, we had many heartfelt discussions about our identities, family, ancestry, and other topics we felt needed to be talked about. I bonded with the other youth through fun activities such as movies, dance parties, karaoke, face masks, and even through worship. We were split into three groups, so they were our family within the THRIVE family, and planned meals, activities for the night, and worship which was held at 9pm every night. My group's worship focused on being connected to our ancestors through nature. My friend, who is Pagan, taught us how to yoik, which is a northern European shamanic style of singing that is meant to awaken a person or animal in a spiritual way. We learned a yoik to connect us to our ancestors and bring them into the room with us.

I learned a great deal from THRIVE, but the one thing I learned and will always cherish is who I am. I never thought about my identity much until then. I know that I am African American and that my ancestors originated from the west coast of Africa (Ivory Coast, Ghana, Senegal, Cameroon, and Congo). I feel more connected to my African roots and appreciate them more. I am proud to be an African American and feel that my ancestors are proud of my accomplishments.

Thank you for allowing me to experience this amazing program; I definitely have become a stronger person because of it.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION (RE) FOR CHILDREN & YOUTH

As I write this article, I am preparing to go to my wife's sister's house for a Rosh Hashanah meal. The Jewish tradition is rich with spiritual practice, particularly when it comes to food. I have come to really appreciate that and I always look forward to these events. I am reminded of the times when my family would simply hold hands for a moment of silence before our meal, back when we ate our meals together. Now my daughter is going to college and working odd hours. We barely get to see her even though she lives with us. I get home late from my long commute. My wife sees clients late. My wife and I eat our meals upstairs. My mother, whom we live with, eats her meal seated in her comfy chair in front of the TV downstairs. It is increasingly rare that we all sit down together for a meal. I miss the spiritual practice of sitting in silence together, holding hands.

Does your family have a spiritual practice? Is there a ritual you do to connect your family with each other? I encourage you to do something like what we used to do or to find another one. It could be as simple as everyone doing the table setting and meal preparation together. It could be singing together or going for a walk together. Although it is somewhat clichéd, there is something profound and grounding in having a ritual that we as a family do together. Each of us may have our own spiritual practice, but having one for the family is different. It reminds us of our connection and the love we share. As I sit amongst my in-laws tonight, I will take care to notice the rituals and make sure I participate.
