#### **Our Theme for November:**

#### What Does It Mean to Be Community of Story?

Our lives are not just made up of stories; they are also *made by* stories. This might be the most important reminder of this month. Indeed, who of us hasn't felt the power of a story? We're all influenced by the stories in our lives – some we write, others may be written for us.

For instance, who can't relate to the friend that tells us that her family "clings to the story about how I'm the clumsy one." We've never seen our friend trip, not once. Or drop a thing, ever. And yet, somehow, when she goes to her parents' home or back to a family reunion, she spills coffee on at least one outfit, stubs at least one toe and stumbles down at least one step. There it is: the power of story!

Or think about our current struggles with economic or racial justice. The incredible income gap is described as "natural" or "the result of complex global dynamics over which we have little control." Similarly, the story of race in our country is told with an "entrenched" story arc. Not only are they powerful; stories can be debilitating.

So let's tell a new story! The ability to choose our stories is at the heart of our faith. Our stories need not be predetermined. Remember that old theological debate that produced Unitarian Universalism? Some said that God had predestined not just the big story of humanity, but our individual stories too. Some of us were slotted for heaven and others for hell. And God had written the list in ink and there was nothing any of us could do about it.

"Well," said our spiritual ancestors, "that's a bit harsh, don't you think?" Forget this extreme fate-driven story, they said. Freedom has a much bigger role than we're giving it credit for. God is not so much the author of the story as she is the magical muse that needles and nags us to put our own stamp on the narratives before us. In other words, we come from a long-line of spiritual relatives who agreed with Shakespeare that "All the world's a stage," but then went on to clarify that it's an improv show to which we've all been invited.

So let's consider our stories this month. The ones we tell, the ones that are told about us. The stories against which we struggle, even the stories we call "truth." We could even make our story into a tale of liberation and love.

#### **Building a Loving Congregation**



By now, I hope that some, if not many, of you have heard about a young, but exciting, effort underway to strengthen the health and vitality of our beloved community. I use the term

"strengthen" intentionally, because the effort is a process — a step-by-step, deliberate process — to develop more dynamic Board/Minister leadership, a church-wide clarity about our highest aspirations, and church-wide relationships built upon a strong, solid foundation of love.

Our forthcoming tasks are based upon the works of internationally renowned and respected leadership consultant Patrick Lencioni, known for his work with churches, non-profits, and corporations of all sizes. We are also aligning our plans with organizational resources and staff from UUA. Our emerging effort began with the Committee on Ministry's interviews and meetings with nine other committees in the church. Gradually, the work has blossomed to include the ministerial evaluation process and the development of a small working group comprised of the Board Executive Committee and the chairs of the Committee on Ministry and the Long-Range Planning Committee.

Your Board of Trustees was presented with Lencioni's work at its annual retreat in August and, through the work in progress, the Board has begun to strengthen itself as the church's Leadership Team. Think of leadership as a pyramid whose bottom, and therefore strongest, layer is TRUST. Building trust among ourselves as Board members and nurturing increased trust among all leaders and congregants is vital to a strong, loving community.

Please know that your Board of Trustees and Minister are working hard to develop a strong foundation for the future of the UUCLV. We are beginning this journey by seeking to become the most trusting, focused, and accountable Leadership Team we can be. We will certainly communicate the details and progress of our work as the effort evolves, and we look forward to inviting you, the full congregation, into church-wide conversations about the "heart" of who we are and who we might be as a beloved community!

In the meantime, we ask for your patience, for in loving congregations, as in many things in life, patience is a virtue. We also ask for your support and encouragement. Finally, we ask that you feel free to contact any member of our working group to learn more.

Generally speaking, cash flow was quite good, Income was comfortably ahead of our straight-line budget, and Expenses were about on schedule. However, Pledge Payments, Total Income and Net Income all were relatively low compared to first-quarter experience in recent years. This is being watched closely by the Finance Committee.

# RELIGIOUS EDUCATION (RE) FOR CHILDREN AND YOUTH

As our Adult Faith Discussion group *Spirit of Life* winds up, the next class will be *Owning Your Religious Past*. This is a five-session program designed to help participants reckon with their religious upbringings and integrate them into their current religious lives. Here is the description from the curriculum book:

The majority of Unitarian Universalists come into the denomination from other religions; often there have been several stops along the path into our congregations. Some bring with them angry and unresolved feelings about experiences in other religious institutions, others have warm memories. Some move easily into an identity as a Unitarian Universalist; others experience a traumatic estrangement from family and from the center of their culture.

Our churches and fellowships have frequently neglected to understand and acknowledge the widely varying needs of members regarding this process. We can be most fully and completely present in our religious identity when we see our path as a continuum rather than a series of unrelated episodes. People who feel whole in this identity are more likely to make solid, healthy commitments to religious communities. Because we are usually more certain of what we left in another religion than what we bring forward from it, some tools are needed by which people may establish connections, bridges, and resonances between past and present. Such activity also provides clues about the possible future direction of those paths. This workshop is not just for "converts." Longtime and life-long Unitarian *Universalists also experience change, sometimes* profoundly, in their religious identity. This workshop is enriched by the participation of people of varying tenure as Unitarian Universalists.

Our first class will be on January 8 at 9:00am and continue every other week for five weeks. If you have any questions, or are interested in participating, contact me. Child care will be available on request.

We renewed the two beds to either side of the Center Street entrance and started planting with donations from the fall native plant sale. The Green Committee thanks all the involved people.

# FAIR TRADE, EMPOWERING WOMEN, AND HOLIDAY SHOPPING

Global Mamas handmade fair trade items will be available after church on Sundays, November 6 thru December 4. There are charming batik dresses for girls in sizes 2 – 8, onesies and shirts for babies and kids up to size 8, home décor products including batik aprons, tablecloths, placemats, trivets, pot holders, napkins, button baskets, and bins, a few women's blouses skirts, and dresses (below the knee),3 men's shirts, jewelry and ornaments crafted from recycled glass beads, and skin care products and soaps made with shea butter from a tree in Ghana. You will be helping to support women in Ghana to send their children to school at the same time. Ten percent of all proceeds will go to UUCLV.

# THE ADOPT-A-WINDOW PROJECT CELEBRATED



On October 9th, the UUCLV celebrated the completed exterior painting project labelled "Adopt-a-Window", thus making our Center Street appearance a point of pride! During coffee hour, hot dogs and corn-on-thecob prepared by Dora Davenport, and a rousing round of applause marked the successful end to this monumental endeavor. To quote members Karen & Chuck West (and others), "The UUCLV is getting its curbside appeal back". And we add with considerable pride, that *no bank loan was needed*.

Overseen by the Property Committee headed by Pat Herring and contracted to Del Painting & Finishing of



Allentown, this monumental job was conducted in record time from start to finish, even with the 3-story aerial lift having to take a city-required holiday during Celtic Fest. The UUCLV Board & the Finance Committee approved the project in July. The work was officially concluded by mid-October. That included the fundraising more than \$17,000 from the outstanding generosity of members and friends.

According to Dora who oversaw the daily painting, "By October 14th, the windows were

completely finished along with all the black railings, including the church sign and the garage trim." Much repair went into this project including calking, glazing around window glass, down spout work, and removal of all old (and possibly flawed) exterior candles and

wiring from the windows. The contractors included the repainting and repair of the garage trim, which was an additional plus. Fundraising for the project was based on the original estimate, although Del Painting provided a contract for less. (Thank you, Cari Poole, for this contact.)
