Our Theme for December: What Does It Mean to Be Community of Presence?

Spiritually, presence can mean two radically different things. One the one hand, contemplatives speak of "being present." Presence from this perspective is all about awareness and remembering to "live in the moment." On the other hand, theologians tend to come at presence from the perspective of "otherness." Their concern is not just that we pay attention to the present moment, but that we notice a transcendent Presence that is woven through all moments.

This month, we refuse to takes sides. Attentiveness or otherness? Who says we have to choose? Isn't it true that, more often than not, they dance together more than they compete? Isn't it true that when we are most present, a powerful presence emerges? Pay attention to your child and slowly a confidence and unique self unfolds. Pay attention to the flow of your breathing or the flow of the ocean and something bigger than yourself enters the scene. Look for a long time at a singular tree and eventually it presents itself to you as a world in and unto itself.

The underlying message here is that the world is full of unnoticed gifts and grace. It's a message perfectly fit for this month that so often celebrates presents over presence. In the face of commercials and billboards that tell us our lives will finally be complete if we stuff them with a few more shiny objects or plastic gadgets, our spiritual traditions come along and remind us that our lives are already complete.

So how will you engage this dance? What powerful and meaningful presence is waiting for you to be present to it? What gift is waiting and wanting to emerge? What will your awareness bring into being this month?

Mini-Sabbatical, Part 2

Last summer's mini-sabbatical was great. Time spent hiking and climbing in the Rocky Mountains made it possible for me to return to Bethlehem with revitalized and renewed perspective, insight, and energy. And I was delighted to find our congregation was ready to explore exciting new ways of building community. I cherish this opportunity and look forward to returning in March.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION (RE) FOR CHILDREN AND YOUTH

TALKING WITH OUR CHILDREN ABOUT THE ELECTION

I have been pondering whether to and how to talk about Trump's election with our RE students. Even if they don't bring it up in class, I am sure they are sensing the fear and anger in us adults. The youth group has already spent a Sunday morning talking about the election and I am sure they will revisit it regularly. You can be sure that our children are noticing our fear and anger. They may be fearful in school because of increased bullying. Their parents may be edgy, impatient or quick to anger or they may be unusually silent. If relatives visit that don't share the same perspective, family gatherings may be silent and stiff or they may become heated. Even if the extended family is in agreement politically, there may be a lot of talk at the dinner table about a dark future. Kids pick up our vibes and our stress and they are not very good at sharing their fears.

We need to talk openly but calmly about these things with our children. It is important that we share our fears but not our fear fantasies. There is no need to play out scenarios of apocalyptic Trump world with your children and you should avoid doing that at the dinner table. I recommend you talk about how your family's values are different from Trump's. You can talk about your fear and anger and things you plan to do to make your voice heard and what activities you will do to keep you calm and grounded. Give a hopeful vision for your children's future while sharing that it may take longer than we thought and it may take struggle to get there. Martin Luther King's message was one of hope at the same time seeking redress for wrongs. It was not sugar coated. Be mindful of what messages you are giving your children and by all means give them opportunities to share their fears and thoughts and validate them.

Following a Parent Meeting and Parent/Child Orientation, the 8 sessions engage children with stories, songs and activities and include a weekly HomeLink - a homework project for parents and children to do together. It promotes dialogue between parent and child.

JOIN US FOR A LINK PIZZA PARTY!


